OUR MAY 11 PREACHER REV. KATIE ROMANO GRIFFIN

On Thursday May 11th, DRUUMM will host our annual Public Worship open to all via a large Zoom gathering. This live service will feature our guest preacher, the Rev. Katie Romano Griffin, minister of our All Souls congregation in Indianpolis, Indiana.



Rev. Katie Romano Griffin Rev. Katie roots her ministry in relationships, and in the belief that each person is inherently good and worthy of love. She is a passionate activist who believes in centering the voices of historically marginalized communities in justice work and advocates for applying an intersectional lens as we work towards co-creating a just world for all.

Prior to being called to All Souls Indy where she serves as the first called BIPOC minister, Rev. Katie served Cedar Lane Unitarian Universalist Church in the DC Metro as an Associate Minister. Before entering professional ministry, she served as a lay campus minister at Florida Gulf Coast University, had a rich career as a nurse, and worked as the co-owner of a marketing and public relations company. She has a background in coaching and hypnosis, too.

Rev. Katie is a 2017 graduate of Meadville Lombard Theological School. She serves as a Civil Air Patrol Chaplain with an emphasis on providing emergency/disaster ministry. She serves as a member of the UUA Ministerial Fellowship Committee, the UU Trauma Response Ministry and she has worked with the Sophia Lyon Fahs **Educational Collaborative in** developing a multi-faith, multicultural curriculum. She is a coauthor of the book, Class Action: The Struggle with Classism in Unitarian Universalism and has been a contributor to the blog Braver/Wiser.

STATEMENT OF ORGANIZATIONAL ROLE

DRUUMM is Unitarian Universalism's oldest and largest people-of-color collective. Building on the legacy of many who came before us, our ministry strives to be multicultural, intersectional, agitating, liberating, and transformative. In a world harmed by white supremacy culture, we work to generate and nurture faithful cultures of solidarity, advocacy, and care.

DRUUMM is proof that a diverse Unitarian Universalism exists. We are a front door for people new to the faith and a spiritual home that nourishes and retains people of color in our liberal religious tradition.

Organizationally, we offer year-round programs that include worship led by UUs of color, culturally specific caucuses, fellowship at General Assembly, faith formation, and leadership development. We also empower members to co-create programs that meet their needs. In partnership with the Unitarian Universalist Association, we journey toward an accountable, intersectional, anti-racist, and anti-oppressive faith.

We prioritize convening, collaborating, and covenanting as we build beloved community. We celebrate spirituality and practice love as lifelong learners. We are invested in cultivating authentic, mutual relationships that center people of color and communities directly affected by marginalization. We are sustained by this work's transforming power for ourselves and for the wider UU community.

STATEMENT OF STRATEGIC DIRECTION

As a Unitarian Universalist people-of-color collective, we prioritize:

- 1. Cultivating beloved Unitarian Universalist communities that make space for liberatory worship and programming;
- 2. Holding ourselves and the larger community to covenant around multiculturalism, intersectionality, anti-racism, and antioppression;
- 3. Resourcing and organizing sustainable regional and identity-based networks of DRUUMM members;
- 4. Developing intentional opportunities for families, youth and young adults; and
- 5. Ensuring each person of color who enters Unitarian Universalism learns of DRUUMM.

Yet, this is not the only recent mass shooting of AAPIs. How about the Georgia Spa murders 2 years ago? In addition, the Laguna Woods Church shooting last May?

The most recent victims could have easily been my sister, brother, uncle, auntie, jie jie, di di, yi ma, shu shu...What are the issues here?

One, the stigma against receiving mental health support in the AAPI community. There is a downside to the Model Minority myth, which says we Asians have perfect loving families, high achieving children and beautiful homes. Well, what if we don't have those perfect lives? What if we're feeling weak, enraged, anxious, marginalized, disrespected? Who do we turn to that speaks Chinese, Vietnamese, Hmong, Thai, or Hindi, and that is culturally competent?

There needs to be more mental health workers with these qualifications. I encourage young AAPI college students to pursue careers in the mental health field. You are desperately needed! Two, gun control. Neither of these angry men should have had guns! Where were the red flag follow ups? They both had wives and co workers that knew of their untapped anger.

What can we do? Speak out for more AAPI specific Mental Health support and comprehensive Gun Control!

In conclusion, I'm feeling grief, trauma and anger that will take time to process and work through. Many thanks to Rev. Yuri Yamamoto for holding a vigil for UU AAPI's. I'm grateful to be a part of a faith community that offers support in these traumatic times.



GATHERING OUR SELVES WITH RHONDA BROWN

Hi Everyone!

I'm Rhonda Brown, a member of the DRUUMM Advisory Committee and a curriculum designer for the Beloved Conversations program, at Meadville Lombard Theological School.

I want to extend a special invitation to you to participate in our upcoming Spring Beloved Conversations: Within program, called Gathering Our Selves, which has been designed by and for Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BIPOC) participants. It's a program with a focus on BIPOC spiritual formation and with the goal of healing the impact of racism on our lives and spirits, while building community amongst BIPOC UUs.

In my life, this program has been a place where I can be authentic and where I can really engage with my spiritual self, in a welcoming environment. I have had the opportunity to be with other BIPOC UUs in community, focused not only on our pain but also on our joy. The joy of being together, being exactly who we are, in the full depth and beauty of our authentic selves!

This program is different- it's an experience that is really focused on understanding where we are now, in our lives and spiritual journeys, and how to navigate our current realities, while also building a life and a world that is more free, more whole, more liberated.

What is Gathering Our Selves?

Gathering Our Selves is a 12 week program, with three main parts:

- 6 bi-weekly, online Lessons, completed at your own pace, utilizing videos, music, and readings, accompanied by reflection prompts and suggested conversations with a Critical Friend, chosen by the participant;
- 6 bi-weekly small group conversations with a Learning Pod of 4-6 other BIPOC participants, scheduled and facilitated by the small group itself, with a suggested agenda tied to each Lesson; and
- 3 monthly, live Meaning Making Sessions on Zoom, facilitated by our Beloved Conversations Gathering Our Selves Team, with all other BIPOC participants.

Gathering Our Selves costs \$250 for the term, with full and partial scholarships easily accessible. No one will be turned away for lack of funds. Please contact us at belovedconversations@meadville.edu before registering, to request a scholarship.

The program is growing and committed to being emergent and responsive to the needs of our participants. As a member of the Design Team, I am dedicated to meeting members of our learning community where they are and staying attuned to what is needed in this particular moment.

If you have had an experience with Beloved Conversations in the past, I hope you will return and try it again, and be a part of building a UU BIPOC learning community that is connected, grounded, diverse, growing, and centered on the spiritual needs of UU BIPOC.

I am honored to work both with DRUUMM and Beloved Conversations and feel that these two communities share so much in common, in terms of vision, radical inclusion, and a commitment to a more faithful Unitarian Universalism.
